DELVING INTO THE PSALMS

The Psalms: a collection of ancient Hebrew poems, songs and prayers by various writers complied by the people of Israel some time after their exile in Babylon

Deliberately and cleverly collated into five different yet overlapping sections and themes

Served as a form of temple worship for the templeless people God

PSALM 130 "A SONG OF ASCENTS"

The Songs of Ascent are a collection of fifteen psalms (Psalms 120-134) found in the Book of Psalms. The term "ascent" renders the Hebrew word often associated with "going up," connecting these psalms to journeys toward Jerusalem, which sits at a higher elevation geographically. They are sometimes called "Pilgrim Psalms" because many believe they were sung by faithful worshippers traveling up to the Temple during the feasts (e.g., Passover, Pentecost, Tabernacles).



A PILGRIM'S PSALM

We do not have to ascend the hill to Jerusalem in order to experience the presence of God

Wherever we are at on our journey through life, we can be pilgrims making progress

This is a psalm that can help us journey toward the presence of The Lord

1 Out of the depths I cry to you, Lord;

FROM THE DEEP

The Hebrew for 'call' here can be translated in past or past tense: call, called or have called

The Hebrew word for 'the depths' carries the connotation of profundity - we've all been there

The main word in this sentence is YHWH

No matter how far you feel you may have fallen, please cry out to The Lord

2 Lord, hear my voice. Let your ears be attentive to my cry for mercy.

HE HEARS

The overwhelming message of scripture is that God sees, knows and hears it all

God hears the good, the bad and the ugly of all we do and say

We can be sure that when we call out to Him, God is listening (Psalm 34:17)

MERCY ME

Plea, call for mercy, earnest prayer - like a cry for salvation and deliverance

We all have moments in our lives where we might call out to God to rescue us

Our greatest need is to be rescued from our sin and its consequences

3 If you, Lord, kept a record of sins, Lord, who could stand?

Lord if You marked our transgressions who would stand Thanks to Your grace we are cleansed by the blood of the Lamb

NOT ONE OF US COULD STAND BEFORE THE THRONE OF GOD, BUT FOR THE MERCY THAT IS OURS THROUGH THE BLOOD OF CHRIST

RECORD KEEPING

We have all sinned and fallen short of the standard required to stand in the glory of God (Romans 3:23)

This is what we need His mercy

But God... has granted us the gift of enteral life in Christ Jesus our Lord (Romans 6:23)

4 But with you there is forgiveness, so that we can, with reverence, serve you.

THERE IS FORGIVENESS!

FORGIVENESS

This was written prior to the cross!

God has been seeking to pour His mercy out and to forgive humankind ever since we've been sinning!

And here we find a key difference between the religions of the world relationship with God

WE CANNOT EARN GOD'S MERCY THROUGH OUR OWN GOOD WORKS, WE RECEIVE FORGIVENESS AS A GIFT OF GRACE THROUGH THE WORK OF CHRIST

LIVING FROM FORGIVENESS

There is a world of difference between working for forgiveness and walking in forgiveness

His grace and mercy should be all the motivation we need to serve God with all our hearts

But this is not 'free for all' or frivolous flaunting of grace - we serve with reverent fear

5 I wait for the Lord, my whole being waits, and in his word I put my hope.

WE ALL PUT OUT HOPE IN SOMETHING - WE PUT OUR HOPE IN THE WORD OF THE LORD

6 I wait for the Lord more than watchmen wait for the morning, more than watchmen wait for the morning.





In ancient Israel, cities were often fortified with walls, and watchmen were stationed on these walls or in towers to keep an eye out for approaching enemies or any potential threats. Their primary duty was to sound the alarm to alert the inhabitants of impending danger. This role required constant vigilance and a keen sense of awareness, as the safety of the city depended on their ability to detect and announce threats promptly.

WAITING ON THE WALLS

The imagery of the watchmen is about eager anticipation and hope of coming relief

This carries an intense sense of desperation, urgency and determination... times two!

Is our desire for the Lord as strong as our desire for anything else we are looking for?

THE WATCHMAN WAS KNOWN FOR LOOKING OUT FOR ENEMY ATTACKS, BUT IMAGINE THEIR EXCITEMENT AT SEEING THEIR OWN KING AND ARMY RETURNING FROM BATTLE OR EXPEDITION!

7 Israel, put your hope in the Lord, for with the Lord is unfailing love and with him is full redemption.

FULL GOSPEL

Here again we are able to ensure we are looking at the Old Testament through the lenses of Christ

The Lord is, by very nature and in all His interaction with humankind throughout history, love

The greatest evidence and expression of His love is in The Lord Jesus laying down His life for us

8 He himself will redeem Israel from all their sins.

LITTLE DID THE PSALMIST KNOW HOW HE HIMSELF WOULD REDEEM ISRAEL, AND ALL WHO PUT THEIR HOPE IN HIM, FROM THEIR SINS

This redemption is redemption from all sin. Jesus Christ saves his people from their sins, both from the condemning and from the commanding power of sin. It is plenteous redemption; there is an all-sufficient fulness in the Redeemer, enough for all, enough for each; therefore enough for me, says the believer. Redemption from sin includes redemption from all other evils, therefore it is a plenteous redemption, through the atoning blood of Jesus, who shall redeem his people from all their sins. All that wait on God for mercy and grace, are sure to have peace.

FROM THE DEPTHS OF DESPAIR OR WHILST WATCHING FROM THE WALLS, LET US HOPE IN THE LORD, KNOW HIS FORGIVENESS AND REDEMPTION AND SERVE HIM WITH ALL THAT WE HAVE
